#### Strategic Purpose statement/ Te rautaki o te tohu

The purpose of this qualification is to provide the wind energy industry with graduates who have the skills and knowledge to work safely while operating and maintaining wind turbine systems to meet legislative requirements and manufacturer's specifications on a wind farm.

This qualification is suitable for those entering directly into the industry, or for people who have an electrical, mechanical, or hydraulics background.

Graduates will be able to operate under limited supervision.

Graduates of this qualification will be able to:

- Work safely and effectively in a wind farm environment in accordance with workplace policies, procedures and relevant regulations.
- Operate and maintain electrical, mechanical and hydraulic systems used in wind turbines to comply with manufacturer's and asset owner's specifications.

This qualification can build on the New Zealand Certificate in Electricity Supply (Introductory) (Level 2) with strands in Electrical Works, Telecommunications, and Wind Farm [Ref: 2136].

This qualification can lead onto version 3 of the New Zealand Certificate in Wind Farm Maintenance (Level 4) [Ref: 3793].
